CO 3/6 RNZIR - LTCOL Oily Te Ua

Tena koutou. Ko Hikurangi te Maunga, ko Waiapu te awa, ko Ngati Porou te Iwi.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself to the members of the 6th Hauraki Association.

My first attempt to join 6th Hauraki Battalion was in 1992 as a student at Waikato University. Demand to join was high and places were limited and I was put on a year long waiting list. Not wanting to delay joining the Army, and having a couple of flat mates who had joined the Guns, I joined 4 (G) Mdm Battery and thoroughly enjoyed my service with the Royal Regiment. I have also held a range of other positions such as a Recruiting Officer, Adjutant of the Combat Battalion, Auckland Northland Regiment and a very satisfying role training officer cadets. I have completed two operational tours: East Timor in 2002 in a Civil Military Affairs role and to HQ ISAF in Kabul as a Team Leader/Liaison Officer in 2009.

It is my great pleasure to take command of 3/6 RNZIR with effect from 7 December last year. The Charter/handover parade went smoothly in outstanding weather. I'd like to acknowledge one of the 6th Hauraki Battalion stalwarts, Capt (Rtd) Peter Bos MBE, who attended the parade as a guest of mine and quickly slotted back into familiar habits in the bar latter on that evening.

My main effort as CO is training soldiers and officers to achieve BLOC – basic level of competence. The basic level of competence is defined through a list of tasks that the team have to qualify on such as passing an Required Fitness Level test, the Battler Efficiency Test, and qualifying on a range of weapons systems.

Last weekend I visited our Infantry Module One training that was conducted in the bush near Minginui. 24 soldiers undertook the training including soldiers from different RF units. Under the guidance of the TWO this training was well planned and well executed. I sat in on the patrol debriefs and was pleased with the standard of debriefs from the Patrol Commanders and Patrol members and the basic soldier skills they learnt from this training.

ANZAC Day is quickly looming on the horizon. As you'd expect the Battalion is inundated with requests for support from many organisations. These are all being managed centrally in Wellington with tasks coming back to the RSM to de-conflict on the ground.

With effect from 1 April this year Captain Vince Copeland will assume command of Hauraki Company from Major Dave Bickner. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Major Dave for his service to the Battalion and welcome Captain Vince back into the Battalion.

My focus over the next month is to work with my command team to draft the Battalion training programme for the 2015/16 year. This weekend I will attend the Formation Command Conference in Waiouru and also support the 3/6 team in the Annual Army Shooting Competition.

He hoped the honour would be shared throughout the team. "I'm very humbled but quite excited too that people have recognised the business and my part in it."

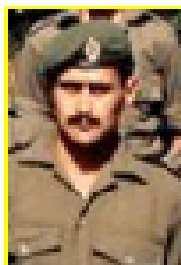
ISO is a multi-faceted service provider in logistics and IT solutions, providing services in ports throughout New Zealand and in Australia.

Retired Hauraki Officer; Roma Hippolite, has been made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM) for services to Māori and health.

Roma helped steer a way through complex negotiations for top of the South Is. Iwi to settle Treaty of Waitangi claims, he is also recognised for his services to Maori health, including contributing as a member of the Nelson Marlborough District Health Board, a founding member of the Nelson Tasman Primary Health Organisation and chairing Te Rau Matatini, set up to develop a workforce across the Maori health and disability sectors.

In learning of his honour, Roma saw his work as just one of the team, "I thought I was just doing my job," he said.

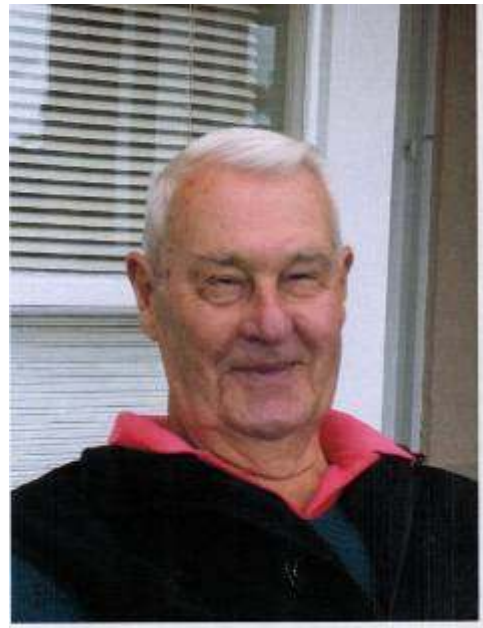
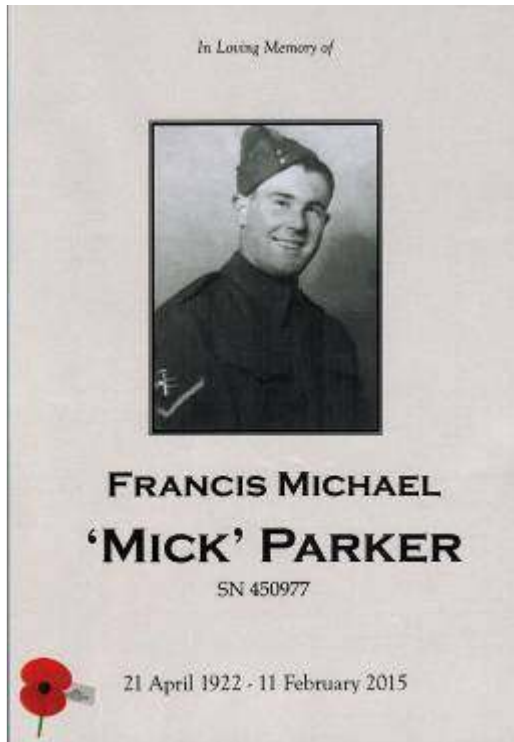
Roma now lives in Melbourne with his wife, Robyn, and works in market research broking. But he says "Nelson will always be home".

Hi Des,

I have just finished the successful project to commemorate the Christmas Truce story (or Snoopys Christmas as it is known). Many churches mentioned it in their services, there were several football games, education in schools and reasonable media coverage. It was a very significant event in the centenary of WW1 that was hard to market at first and should not have been left to just me to organize - but I was pleased to have done so.

My latest project is to present Belgian flags to RSA's and other commemoration organisations in NZ. The reasons:

- (1) Belgium is the closest link to NZ in our war history. We went to WW1 to protect the neutral country of Belgium as if the Germans had conquered Belgium, the UK would have been an easy step.
- (2) Most of our fighting was in Belgium. It was the new home for our boys and sadly for many, their last.
- (3) The majority of our war dead still lie in Belgium (over 5,000) - but that figure is debatable as many died in Flanders which had part of it in France at that time. Another statistical problem - many

were mortally wounded in Belgium but were taken to safer French dressing stations where they actually died. Did therefore they die in Belgium or France? They were certainly killed in action in Belgium, making that figure much higher out of the 12,000 who died in Flanders. By the way 2,700 died at Gallipoli and mainly of disease not combat - an interesting comparison given we only ever hear of Gallipoli and rarely of Flanders. We even mistakenly call the Poppy an "Anzac" Poppy..

(4) Belgium is the country of NZ's worst disaster - Passchendaele.

(5) The Belgians still to this day are more than grateful for NZ's efforts and losses. They have a commonly used expression "the Belgians have not forgotten". The Menin Gate ceremony each night is testimony to that. Sadly it is NZ that has forgotten. Wherever I went around Belgium it was always "thankyou thankyou thankyou".

(6) It is important we start a new bond with Belgium as they are looking after the majority of our fallen.

Why hasn't the Belgium flag been used in our commemorations in the past? 2 reasons

(1) The NZ RSA has preferred to fly the Australian flag in the mistaken belief all our fighting was in one with the Australians - in the same way NZ later copied Aussie in having dawn services when it was Australia that landed at dawn and not us!

(2) The fear that the Belgium flag if flown the wrong way will look like the German flag & the ignorance that it is the Waikato flag.

I enclose a pic of myself and Bob Davis presenting the first flag to the Timaru RSA. Des, I will pass on some poems I have written at a later date.
